Course Description

This course focuses on nineteenth century British science and its social, political, cultural, and intellectual contexts. Adopting the "contextualist" approach to the history of science allows us to raise a series of provocative questions: in what way did all of these different contexts shape the "nature" of nineteenth century scientific thought? how were scientific "facts" socially constructed? what was it about the nineteenth century context that led many intellectuals to reject Christianity and embrace science as providing a new, privileged form of knowledge? Included among the topics to be covered are the discourse of natural theology, radical working class evolutionism during the 1830's, the plurality of worlds debate, science and gender, the professionalization of science, the literary structure of Darwin's Origin of Species, Darwinian theory and its ideological uses, science and imperialism, the popularization of science, the practice of science, and late nineteenth century physics and psychics.

Course Requirements

There will be one two and a half hour group discussion per week on Wednesdays from 11:30-2:30. These sessions will focus directly on the assigned readings. All members of the course will be expected to have read the assigned readings with care and forethought, and to come to class prepared to discuss the readings with the other members of the group:
